In Loving Memory of:

Claude James Triplett (affectionately known as CJ III) was born on July 7, 1929, in the Minnieville community located near Woodbridge, Virginia to John Weaver Triplett and Anita Virginia Thomas. He was the third child and oldest son of seven children. The family lived in Alexandria, Virginia, where he graduated from Parker Gray High School.

After high school, he served in the Army's 7th Military Police Company in the Second Army Area during the Korean Conflict. He received an Honorable Discharge as a Service Disabled Veteran and was decorated with the Korean and United Nation Meritorious Service Medals.

Recognizing the importance of education and taking advantage of the GI bill, he enrolled in West Virginia State College and earned a B.S. in Industrial Arts Education. Upon graduation he and his college sweetheart Marie Catheryn White married and moved to Detroit to start their teaching careers.

Claude continued his education at Wayne State University, earning a M.E. in

Vocational Administration and Ed. Sp. in Administration Supervision. His many assignments included Assistant Principal and Principal at Condon Jr. High School, Principal at Chadsey High School, and Director of Golightly Technical Center and Randolph Technical Center. He had a reputation of “taking no nonsense” and mentored countless students, guiding them toward vocational careers in the industrial arts.

During his career he served on the executive board of OSAS and board of directors of the Black United Fund; was a member of the Urban League, Inc. and Phi Delta Kappa, and advisory member of the Detroit Sex Equity Project. He was named Outstanding Vocational Administrator by VICA and Outstanding Vocational Educator by MDEA.

Known to his family and friends for his commanding and loving presence, Claude was a spirited, gregarious, and fun-loving host to those who were fortunate enough to be his friend. He enjoyed traveling, especially to Florida and the Caribbean, and realized a lifelong goal of visiting all fifty states.

Claude passed away peacefully on May 17, 2022, at Angela Hospice Care Center. He is preceded in death by his daughter Teresa (Terri) Marie Triplett, brothers Albert Triplett, John Triplett, and Oswald Triplett and sister Jennie Triplett Harris. He leaves to cherish his memory: longtime partner and devoted caregiver Barbara Swann; his sisters Phyllis Bickham and Jean Kennedy; children Claudia Dion Triplett DeBose (Andre), and Rodney Smith; and grandsons Brenden Joseph DeBose and Elliott Claude DeBose, cousins, nieces, nephews, and a bevy of beloved extended family and friends.

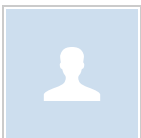

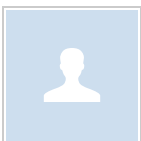
